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Growing up in Russia, International Channel graphic designer Katia Gelman shares her New Year's experience.

A Russian New Year's celebration would not be complete without Father Frost and his granddaughter, Snowmaiden. Father Frost looks a lot like Santa Claus: he carries a big red sack full of presents and is very kind and just. Snowmaiden is a young girl who wears a light-blue dress and hat and loves all creatures.

Miniature Father Frost and Snowmaiden characters are often placed under New Year trees in Russian homes. The tree is brought into the house the last week of December and is decorated with lights, glass toys and balls, sweets and small tangerines. Friends and family gather around the New Year tree on New Year's Eve to play games and enjoy being together.

There is more than enough food for whomever drops by, and champagne is a must. Around 11 p.m., everyone says goodbye to the year by sharing with one another the bad and good things that occurred over the course of the year. Just before midnight, people tune into the television to listen to the president and watch the clock tower in Red Square. When the clock strikes midnight, wishes of "Happy New Year" and kisses abound. After that, Russians drink, eat, dance and celebrate the New Year until the early-morning hours.

A BERRY RUSSIAN NEW YEAR! RUSSIAN OLADII (CRUMPETS)

- 2 1/2 cups wheat flour
- 1 1/2 cups water
- 1 oz yeast
- 2 tbsp sugar

- frozen/fresh blackberries
- 1/2 grated lemon peel - pinch of salt
- 1 large bag/package of - powdered sugar
 - butter or vegetable oil for cooking

Directions: Thaw fruit, if using frozen fruit. Mix yeast in warm water; add salt, sugar and lemon peel. Add flour. Mix, and let stand in a warm place.

Heat butter or oil in pan. Add several blackberries and pour dough on top of them enough to lightly cover fruit. Once dough is golden-brown, turn the crumpet over. Sprinkle berry side of the crumpets with powdered sugar. You can cook oladii with any type of fruit or berries.
